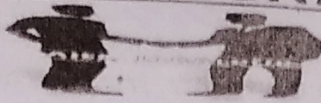


MEETING & GREETING

Or what's up?

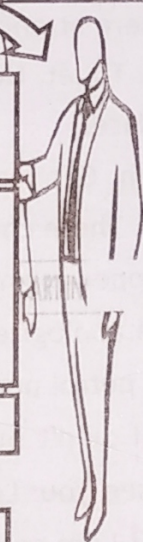
How is life?
