incipient



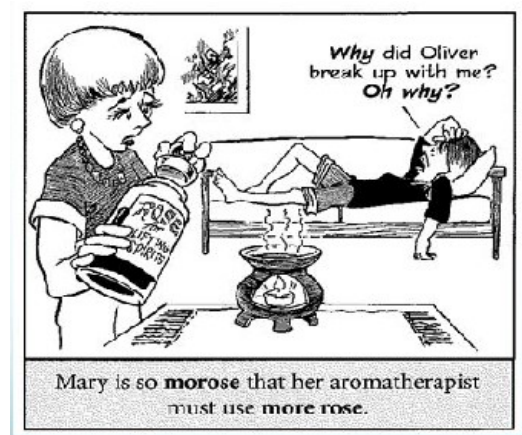
(adj.) beginning to come into being or to become apparent

(adj.) Evoking intense aversion or dislike

opaque

Light cannot move through it. A solid that you cannot see through. Wood and metals are opaque materials.



(adj.) impenetrable by light; not reflecting light

Pronunciation: /'pi:əs/, rhymes with bias



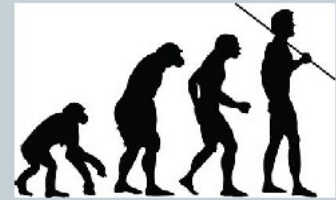
having or showing a deep respect for God and religion

Definition: something that comes before

Example Sentence:

A sore throat is often a precursor to a cold.

Hard work on the practice field is usually a precursor to a win on the game field.
