

Await (v)

[ə'weɪt]

Mean: To await something means to wait for it.

Example: The players awaited the judge's decision.

Awake (adj)

[ə'weik]

Mean: When you are awake, you are not asleep.

Example: Sometimes I lay awake in bed because I am not tired.

Award (n)

[bːcw'e]

Mean: An award is a prize someone gets for doing something well.

Example: He got an award for having the best grades in class.

Aware (adj)

[ə'weə]

Mean: If you are aware of something, you know about it.

Example: I was not aware of the ringing phone.

Awesome (adj)

['ɔːsəm]

Mean: If something or someone is awesome, they are impressive or frightening.

Example: The huge military plane was an awesome sight.

Awful (adj)

[l(e)lːc']

Mean: When something is awful, it is very bad.

Example: Her performance last night was awful.

Awhile (adv)

[ə'waɪl]

Mean: If you do something awhile, you do it for a short time.

Example: Wait here awhile, and I'll bring some tea.

Awkward (adj)

['ɔːkwəd]

Mean: If something is awkward, it is embarrassing and uncomfortable.

Example: After dropping his coffee cup, Robbie felt awkward.

Ax (n)

[æks]

Mean: An ax is a tool used to cut wood.

Example: She used an ax to cut some wood for the fire.

Bachelor (n)

['bæʧ(ə)lə]

Mean: A bachelor is an unmarried man.

Example: Since he was a bachelor, Jason did his shopping by himself.
